We have strengthened our innovation system working, building and developing relationships with partners organisations across Dorset. We are on a journey and recognise it will take time and ongoing effort to ensure that the innovation culture and impact is realised and continues to be imbedded in Dorset

We understand it's not easy implementing innovation. The key we use is working together as a system and providing support and advice. Innovation Unit Learning Event

Adapting and Adopting Innovation through Coproduction and Participation

Patients and service users should be seen as a central stakeholder in any change project within health and care services. Involving patients and service users in such projects brings an unique perspective and knowledge base, obtained through lived experience. Inclusion in this way acts to inform and strengthen a project's purpose and direction, as well as maximise potential for sustainability.

However, there can be challenges to achieving this in practice especially when working towards the goal of full representation and true joint decision making. Therefore, to support Innovation Hub's in achieving participatory approaches to adopting innovation, the <u>Innovation Unit</u> hosted a Learning Event on 24 January focused on co-production.

During the day, hub's were encouraged to stretch thinking about how approaches to co-production could be improved, whilst practical guidance was provided on 'how to do' co-production. Presentations from the <u>Co-production Collective</u> provided practical examples, together with demonstratable value added to a project. Mindsets were examined as perceived values and challenges were raised and worked through.

We were delighted that the Dorset Innovation Hub (DIH) were represented at this event by core team members from Dorset HealthCare, Wessex AHSN, and University Hospitals Dorset together with colleagues from the BU PIER partnership, Wessex PIN and a DIH patient and public involvement (PPI) representative.

Patient and service user involvement is a priority for the DIH, and we are at the early stages of developing this element of our work. Currently we have three PPI reps supporting the work of the DIH, which includes involvement in the Evaluation Working Group as well as the Malnutrition in Ageing People project. Our aim is for this work element to expand and mature as the DIH grows, becoming an elemental feature of all innovation adoption projects.



Blog ~ The Research and Innovation Loop

When it comes to figuring out how to change how we do things in health and social care, there is still the idea in some quarters that this process involves a straight line. In other words, that change follow a simple pattern of



designing, testing, and then adopting and spreading new technologies, or ways of organising and delivering care. But in the real world, the process is often more messy, with information from each step 'forward' feeding back to earlier steps but also missteps while the system embraces an innovation leading to something completely new. And sometimes an idea just takes off! In health and social care, we broadly use the words 'research' to describe the discovery of new things or knowledge generation and 'innovation' to talk about taking research discoveries and developing useful products or processes out of them. In the Dorset Innovation Hub, the different partners, like ARC Wessex, work with each other in this research and innovation loop.

The idea of a research and innovation loop is not new. As something recognisable to modern eyes, we can trace its inception to the Bell Labs, which, in the United States, generated and applied ideas at large scale from the end of the 19th century to the middle of the 20th. Its innovations, spanning theories, technologies, and international use, laid the basis of many of our modern economies.

An important lesson from this long history is that different types of people and teams are needed at different stages of the research and innovation loop. First, there are scientists who need the freedom to think about new ideas without expectations of them being used. Then, applied researchers who, like inventors, use those new ideas to develop a useful process or technology and test them out at a small scale. And finally, innovators who, like engineers, introduce new methods, ideas and or products in the real world to figure out how to make them work for as many people as possible. Importantly, these three groups of people need to work with managers skilled in innovation who shepherd the process and ensure that feedback from the different stages are shared. That feedback is important both for the project at hand and future idea generation.

ARC Wessex fits into this loop by:

- its community of researchers listening to the needs of the health and care system and designing research in response;
- undertaking applied health and care research to generate evidence that can directly supports decision-making about new ways of working; and
- developing resources, tools, and guidance to support health and care organisations make the best use of findings from research and consider how to implement in them in practice.

We do this by bringing together local providers of NHS services, local providers of care services, NHS commissioners, local authorities, universities, private companies, and voluntary and charity organisations. The input from all these parties informs our research portfolio that addresses the specific health or care issues of our region, including Dorset.

In addition, our core management team works to make it more likely that research findings are taken up into practice in several ways. First, our implementation team helps researchers understand that they need to collect evidence about how an innovation is used by people and the effects of factors like different data management systems and building layouts. Second, our education and career development team ensure our early career researchers are prepared to work with system partners and to become decision-makers who are aware of, and put into practice, a



mix of applied research and implementation practices. Third, our communication team helps make messages about research and innovation clear for as many people as possible. Fourth, our patient and public involvement team fosters public engagement and enhancing the outreach and impact of research activities and results at different levels.

So, the main take-away is that new ways of working don't follow a simple, predictable path. Evidence needs help to get somewhere and the Dorset Innovation Hub and its partners like ARC Wessex are a vehicle to support the research and innovation loop which, ultimately, is all about improve patient outcomes, staff satisfaction and supporting economic growth.

Local Priority Innovation Adoption Project Malnutrition in Ageing People

One of the local priority projects in the Dorset Innovation Hub (DIH) work programme, is focused on the prevention of malnutrition in ageing people. Malnutrition is a complex and complicated issue, and one which requires a collaborative approach. To support this project a Malnutrition Steering Group (MSG) has been established, chaired by Dr Andrew Dean (Dorset Healthcare), and contains membership from healthcare providers (acute and community), the voluntary sector, local authority, and emergency services.

At the February 2023 MSG meeting, we said a fond farewell to Dr Samantha Taplin as she moves to Wessex Sussex to take up a new post. Sam has been central to shaping and guiding this project in its early stages. Thank you Sam for all of your invaluable advice, energy & guidance; wishing you all the very best for the future.


